## WELLINGTON FLAG PROJECT ENTRY INSTRUCTIONS

The City of Wellington and the Wellington Area Chamber of Commerce/CVB are sponsoring a Wellington Flag Project to design a City flag that will serve as a symbol of the past, present and future of our community. The public is invited to submit a design for the first official City of Wellington flag. The Flag Project is in conjunction with the 2021 Sesquicentennial Celebration for the City.

#### Timeline:

### October - Contest opens

All information will be released to the public. Entry forms and instructions will be posted online and made available for any member of the public to submit a design.

## November to December - Judging

A review panel will review entries and eliminate any designs that do not adhere to the design principles. The public will then be invited to vote for their favorite entries to narrow the pool down to a group of finalists. A selection committee will be appointed to judge the finalists and select the winning design.

#### 2021 - Announcement of Winner

The winning design will be unveiled at the 2021 annual banquet of the Wellington Area Chamber of Commerce/CVB. The banquet will be held in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2021 with the specific date to be determined. The winner will receive a \$500.00 cash prize. The City Council will then be asked at its next meeting to adopt the design as the City's official flag. The design will be in the public domain and made available for all to use.

## Designers are advised to adhere to these flag design principles:

- Keep it simple The flag should be so simple that a child can draw it from memory.
- **Use meaningful symbolism** The flag's images, colors, or patterns should relate to or tell a compelling story about the community.
- Use 2-3 basic colors.
- No lettering or seals Never use writing of any kind or an organization's seal.
- Be distinctive or be related Avoid duplicating other flags, but use similarities to show connections.
- **Be timeless** Avoid using features that will become dated or obsolete.
- **Consider real-world structure** Images should be legible on both front and back of the flag, and legible while flying or hanging.

## **Entry guidelines:**

- Entries should be designed on a rectangle that can be enlarged to fit a standard 3'x5' ratio and meet the design principles listed above.
- Contest entry is free.
- You must complete and submit a signed Wellington Flag Project Entry Form with each entry.
- Your design entry must be your original work and must not include, be based on, or derived from any third-party designs, trademarks or copyrighted images.
- Each entry may only contain one design. You may submit up to three different design entries.
- Your entry must be received by 5 p.m. on Friday, October 30, 2020 to be eligible for consideration. The Wellington Flag Project is not responsible for entries that are lost, overlooked, damaged or not received by the contest deadline.

## How to submit:

- Submit entries via email to flagproject@cityofwellington.net with subject line "Flag Project". Include a signed Entry form and flag design prepared in digital format (pdf, png, or jpeg) no larger than 8MB.
- Drop off entries at the City Administration Center or the Wellington Area Chamber of Commerce/CVB Office. Include a signed Entry Form with design prepared in digital format on a flash drive accompanied by an 8.5x11 inch color printed version paper copy of the design.
